





So let's have some fun with it!



Make Some Mud Pies

and make some memories

You can start developing your child's math and cooking skills outside of the kitchen by creating mud pie recipes.

Use some nontraditional items for measuring, like cereal boxes and seashells. Then, gather natural elements



outside: dirt, water, rocks, flowers...

Have your child describe the process aloud,

including how much of each ingredient is going into the recipe, like 1 cereal box of dirt, 20 clam shell scoops of water, 10 rocks, 3 handfuls of grass, and so on... and you or your child can write down the ingredients and instructions. Save the recipes among your own recipe collection. They'll be sweet memories for you and your child years from now.
